

Texts From Friends

Objectives:

 Analyze how to answer real-life pediatric medical questions posed to residents by their friends and families using EBM

Props needed:

PowerPoint Slides

How to prepare yourself?

- 1. Ask residents 2 weeks ahead of time to send in questions they have received from friends and family in the form of screenshots
- 2. Select top 6 texts to discuss and research choose varying topics
- 3. Research AAP guidelines answering the questions, seek attending input when convincing literature not available
- 4. Prepare PowerPoint with the text followed by a slide discussing appropriate response

Timeline/Structure:

- Present the "text"
- Open discussion on how residents would respond (2-3 minutes per text)
- Reveal response and AAP guidelines (1-2 minutes per text)


Example:

Fishbowl

Objectives:

 Debate how to answer clinical scenarios with ethical dilemmas; understand how to apply AAP guidelines to these cases

Props needed:

- Cases, PowerPoint Slides
- Attending expert(s)

How to prepare yourself?

- 1. Pick **two topics** with cases/ethical dilemmas
- 2. Research AAP guidelines answering the questions, seek attending input when convincing literature not available
- 3. Prepare one slide with case and question, followed by slide(s) on AAP guidelines

Timeline/Structure:

- Structure the room with one center table (4-5 learners) this is the "Fishbowl."
 Everyone else sits around the corner of the room
- Only members in the fishbowl can debate! If another learner wants to chime in, they must "tap out" one of the fishbowl members.
- Present the case, allow learners to debate. Do not speak during this ©
- At the close of their discussion, present AAP guidelines and allow attending expert to give their thoughts and answer any remaining questions
