



The Children's National Health System is seeking a new Vice-Chair for Medical Education who is a recognized national leader in the field with an established record of excellence in teaching innovation and promoting educational scholarship. Applicants must be board-certified in pediatrics and/or a pediatric subspecialty by the American Board of Pediatrics and must hold a current academic rank of professor.

The successful candidate will be a leader with a vision for further improving interdisciplinary medical education at Children's National and with the energy to implement that vision. S/he will be responsible for all aspects of undergraduate, graduate, and continuing medical education at Children's National. This includes all aspects of educational innovation (eLearning and simulation) and compliance with LCME and ACGME requirements for accreditation. S/he will be the ACGME's Designated Institutional Official (DIO) for Children's National. Academic appointment will be in the Department of Pediatrics at The George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences.

Children's National is a national leader in the education of the future leaders in academic pediatrics. We educate over 1500 trainees annually, including 120 pediatric residents and over 170 subspecialty clinical fellows in 40 different accredited programs. We also provide pediatric training to over 750 visiting residents and fellows from other regional, national, and international institutions. We are the primary teaching site for the Department of Pediatrics at the George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences.

Children's National Health System is based in Washington, DC. It has been serving the nation's children since 1870. Children's National is Magnet® designated. Home to the Children's Research Institute, the Sheikh Zayed Institute for Pediatric Surgical Innovation, and the Child Health Advocacy Institute, Children's National is one of the nation's top five pediatric medical centers according to US News and World Report and one of the top ten NIH-funded pediatric institutions. With a community-based pediatric network, seven regional outpatient centers, an ambulatory surgery center, two emergency departments, an acute care hospital, a new campus for research and innovation on the grounds of the former Walter Reed Army Medical Center, and collaborations throughout the region and abroad, Children's National is recognized for its expertise and innovation in pediatric care and as an advocate for all children.
