The fellow will gain additional skills and knowledge during their subspecialty rotations and advocacy rotations. An approach of progressive responsibility is employed to provide the fellow with the optimal learning experience.

- **Child Abuse Consultation Service**
 - Our team facilitates comprehensive medical evaluations for children alleged to have been physically abused or neglected. Consult on ~ 5000 cases annually with Indiana Department of Child Services.
- **Pediatric Center of Hope**
 - Riley child abuse specialists provide comprehensive medical evaluation for children alleged to have been sexually abused.
- **Foster Care Bridge Program**
 - Riley offers a multidisciplinary program to serve as a bridge— providing comprehensive healthcare and acquiring appropriate resources for children entering and making transitions within the foster care system until a permanent medical home is identified.
- **Docs InCASE Program**
 - In collaboration with 15 pediatric practices across the state, we facilitate pediatric care and coordination in advancing the medical role in child protection.

Our program's team of board-certified physicians provides evidence-based consultation in cases of suspected child maltreatment. 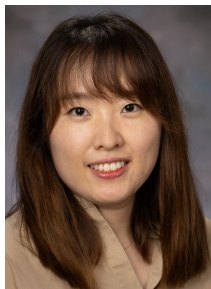
