Program description

The Child Abuse Pediatrics fellowship training program at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh is a 3-year ACGME-accredited program which offers a comprehensive education in child abuse and neglect through hands-on clinical care, didactics, court testimony, and multidisciplinary collaboration. There are 8 faculty members in the Division of Child Advocacy who are actively engaged in teaching.

The Child Advocacy Center at Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh evaluates over 2000 patients per year, providing ample opportunities for education. With a catchment area comprising a 23 county area of Western Pennsylvania, along with referrals from Ohio and West Virginia, there are many opportunities for the fellow to see a wide variety of patients and hone their clinical skills.

The primary learning site is the National Children's Alliance (NCA) accredited Child Advocacy Center at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, where the fellow will build a solid foundation in Child Abuse Pediatrics which will position them for career excellence.

Scholarly activity, teaching, and research

There is a robust medical student and resident rotation in the Division of Child Advocacy which provides the fellow with ongoing teaching opportunities. There are also many ways for the fellow to educate diverse audiences in a variety of settings, including local and national conferences.

The Division of Child Advocacy is a participating site for CAPNET, a collaborative project which enables multi-site research in child abuse through creation of a comprehensive database. Participation in this project, along with several other existing collaborative partnerships and datasets, create multiple prospects for scholarly activity.

The Child Abuse Pediatrics Fellowship at Maimonides Children's Hospital (MCH), New York University (NYU)-Bellevue Hospital and Staten Island University Hospital (SIUH) is accepting fellowship applications for their 3-year ACGME accredited program.

This program offers extensive clinical training in the field of Child Abuse Pediatrics at Maimonides Children's Hospital, the first NACHRI-certified children's hospital and only pediatric trauma center in Brooklyn. The Bellevue-NYU site is a level 1 Trauma Center, while Staten Island University has the only regional Burn Center. The Child Protection Teams at MICH, NYU, and SIUH provides full service consultations with our multidisciplinary teams. This fellowship unites the existing services at all three institutions to provide a comprehensive 3year experience designed to prepare physicians for an academic and clinical career in child abuse pediatrics. Through a collaborative multidisciplinary team model, the service promotes safety, health, and developmental well-being in the life of the vulnerable child. Fellows will train with four Board Certified Child Abuse Pediatricians and have opportunities to work closely with a wide variety of subspecialists and community partners.

Fellows must be graduates of an ACGME accredited pediatric or medicine/pediatrics residency and be eligible to sit for the American Board of Pediatrics Board Examination. We would like 3 letters of reference: 1 must be from your residency program director and another from any Child Abuse Pediatrician that you have worked with.

We are the only fellowship program in NYC. Our multiple training sites allows for continuity of care for vulnerable children!



PROGRAM SPECIFICS

The UNM fellowship in child abuse pediatrics is a 3-year ACGME accredited program that prepares fellows for clinical and academic careers focused on preventing and treating family violence, neglect and exploitation. Fellows are eligible to sit for ABP subspecialty certification at the completion of the program.

New Mexico's diverse population and cultures provide a rich clinical learning environment. UNM has a strong reputation for excellence in education and quality improvement. The University also affords multiple avenues for research across designated research centers, institutes, networks, and signature programs.

CLINICAL EXPERIENCE

The fellowship program includes 24 months of clinical rotations: 10 inpatient and 8 outpatient subspecialty months, and 6 ancillary rotations in child/adolescent psychiatry, care for families with substance use disorders, pediatric and neuro radiology, pediatric physical medicine and rehabilitation, forensic pathology, and special topics in rural and tribal communities.

EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE AND SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

Fellows participate in several educational activities including subspecialty journal club and board preparation, and mentoring for legal testimony. Fellows also attend 1 national conference each year.

During 12 dedicated scholarly months, fellows receive training in clinical research and quality improvement project design, and one on one mentorship with an experienced research mentor. Interested fellows also have access to multidisciplinary research networks.

Fellows also participate in **SafeCare New Mexico**, a Section led telehealth program sponsored by Project ECHO that offers education and mentorship to rural stakeholders. SafeCare's goal is to strengthen our community of practice among pediatric health care practitioners in New Mexico.
