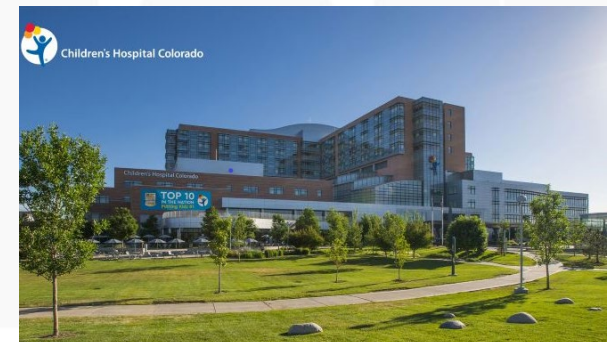

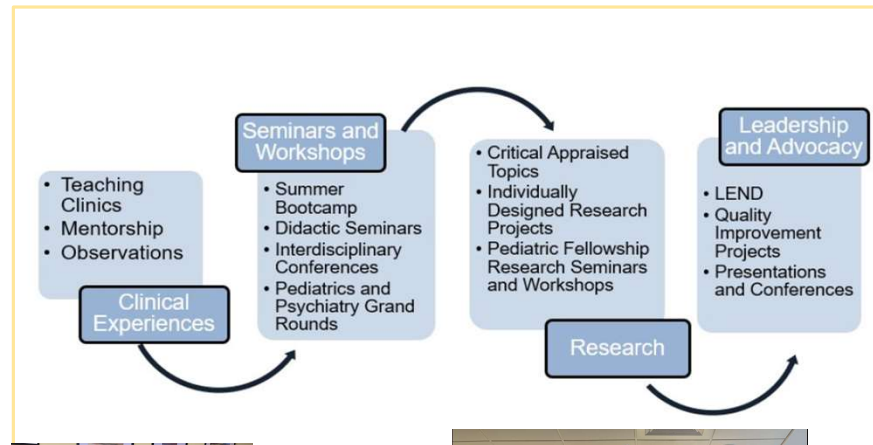
Mission

Commitment to Neurodiversity Affirming Care:

We have introduced the HOPE framework to our clinic, an intentional culture change designed to enhance family engagement and establish strength-based narratives throughout the care experience. In practice, this means making our physical and virtual spaces more accessible to individuals with sensory and learning needs, streamlining intake processes for families with limited English literacy, and reviewing all clinical and administrative workflows to ensure a strength-based perspective.

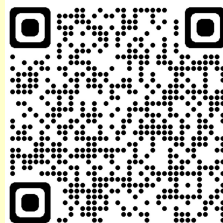

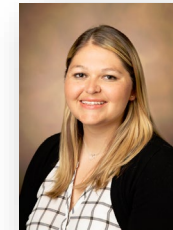

About our Program
 We were among the first DBP fellowship programs accredited by ACGME in 2003. Since that time, 30 fellows have completed our program and practice across the country and the globe, primarily in academic settings. We are among the 13 MCHB/HRSA sponsored DBP fellowship programs, continuously funded since 2007. Our 1st or 2nd year fellows join RI LEND which recruits and prepares graduate-level trainees (including parent and self-advocates) from diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds to become future clinical, academic and community leaders with a goal of improving the health and wellbeing of children with autism and other related developmental disabilities.

All fellows complete a scholarly project with faculty mentorship. Themes of recent projects include:

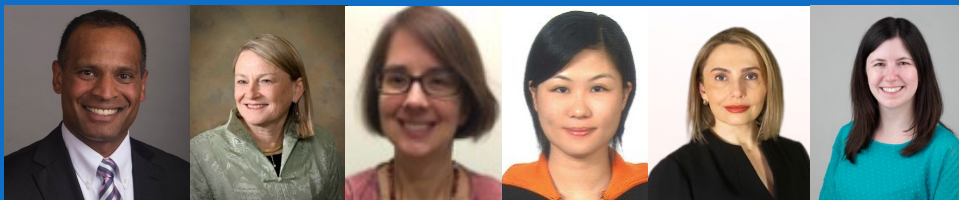

3. Post-Partum Depressive Symptoms and Early Literacy Practices in Rhode Island Families; implementation of a statewide literacy program in pediatric practices and early shared reading with mothers of 2–6-month-old infants
4. Impact of Covid-19 Pandemic on Rhode Island Early Interventions
5. Associations of Adverse Childhood Experiences and Protective Factors with School Engagement

Clinical Training
 Our primary clinical service is imbedded in the Children's Neurodevelopment Center where we practice shoulder-to-shoulder with colleagues in Genetics, Child Neurology, Psychology, Nursing, Social Work, Care Coordination and our Parent Consultants. Fellows first learn clinical skill through close observation of faculty providing care. They gradually increase their precepted assessment including astute child-focused behavioral observation, direct testing including ADOS administration and development of a plan that is strength-based and sensitive to the family's perspective.

- Our strong core curriculum includes weekly seminars (Literature Seminars, Research Symposia, QI, case discussions and didactic sessions) with full participation by faculty and fellows, and speakers from other divisions/departments/institutions when applicable.
- Our fellows typically attend and often present at 2 national meetings each year.
- Our 1st year fellows can take a variety of research courses, including Biostatistics courses in Brown's School of Public Health, Dept. of Pediatrics course and others, and may also apply for the Hassenfeld Scholarship to complete a Certificate in Clinical and Translational Research.
- Fellows rotate through NICU follow-up, Genetics, Child Neurology, a Med-Psych Partial Hospital Program, Children's Rehabilitation Services (Speech, OT, PT and spasticity management), Down Syndrome, Sleep & Fussy Baby clinics and have opportunities to select to rotate in Child Psychiatry day programs or psychopharmacology practice.
