Fellows will rotate through all three sites with a total of 12 months of clinical service plus one Nemours CICU rotation during second year, and one MFM rotation that is divided between Jefferson and Christiana during third year. In addition, fellows will complete a research project and submit a manuscript for publication. We also have the option of participating in a Master's Program, which may be paid by the department.
